  - Consider: What was going on in the place this work was made (religiously, politically, socially) at the time the artwork was created? What was going on in the artist's life? Who was the patron of the work?
- Content
  - Consider: What is the meaning of the work? What is happening in the work? Is any symbolism being used?
- Function
  - Consider: Where was the work meant to be displayed? Who was meant to see the artwork?
     How was it used by the artist or culture who made it? How was it reinterpreted by a different culture (if at all)?
